TUESDAY 28 MARCH, 2023

This evening, logging in with Paul VK2AMT, as VK2SRC were: Duncan VK2DLR, Jeff VK2WSR, Andrew VK2XI and Dave VK2ZDR. As usual, we had a couple of overs on Parrots Nest 2 metres before we changed to 40 metres, 7.048 USB.

We used Fldigi and Olivia 8-500. I had pretty good decode from Duncan, but all sorts of problems decoding Jeff, working through the club 7300 at Richmond Hill. The best I had was only about 50%. Duncan had done some improvements to his OCF dipole. I tried all sorts of adjustments to RF gain and preamps on and off. The signals were just noisy and weak from the clubrooms. Really strange considering that the clubroom radio and antenna is only a few kilometres away, even though it is on the other side of the hill from me.

Later in the net, Duncan also lost a fair bit of Jeff's over but he decoded him better than I did. A couple of days after the net, a test receive session on a voice QSO on 7.197 showed that the 991A's voice receive was indeed weak and noisy compared to the Icom 7410 on the vertical. A switch to the FT997, same OCF dipole antenna and QSO as the 991A, showed that the 897 was much better than the 991A. I suppose that the next digi net will reveal more when I switch to the 897. Thanks to Duncan and Jeff for persevering.

PS: No screenshot this week, the lousy decode on the diginet made me forget it!


SARC Public Liability Insurance Renewal

Silent Key – Ted Smith VK2EGS



Another SARC Elder goes silent.

Ted Smith, VK2EGS (formerly VK2ZFS) passed away peacefully with his family by his side last Monday. He was just 2 months shy of his 93rd birthday. Ted was one of our oldest long term members and has been a member of SARC since before most of us entered amateur radio. There would not be many old hands left that could recall the old days when people like Ted and the Late Horrie Stephens (VK2ZES) would operate mobile using 6 metres AM. Those were the days when transmitter frequencies were derived from a crystal while receivers were tuneable. A mobile 6M net would require everybody to tune into the frequency of the

current operator's transmitter and then re-tune to the next person's frequency. Those were the early days of using second hand ex-commercial or ex-military equipment that was modified for amateur radio use.

Ted was one of the active members who built SARC's first two metre repeater VK2RSC at Parrots Nest. He remained on the repeater committee for many years contributing over a range of areas while specialising in power supplies. A lifetime of work in the electrical supply industry meant that Ted was the "go to " person for all mains power electrical problems and for home built power supplies.

He remained active to the end. Just getting a bit quieter as the years caught up with him. Ted will always be remembered as someone who always lent a hand whenever he could. He also managed to keep a low profile; never displaying his knowledge or experience unless you were close enough and realised he was up there with the best. We'll miss Ted; His conversations were long and deep when he felt relaxed with friends.

At Ted's request there will be a quiet graveside service for close family and friends at the Lismore Memorial Gardens, Skyline Road Goonellabah at 10:00 AM on Wednesday the 5th of April. Club Polo shirts would be appropriate.
